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Election Basics & Voter Guide Policy

You have the right to vote in an Indiana election if:

- You are both a U.S. citizen and a resident of Indiana
- You will be at least 18 years of age by the election date,
 November 7, 2023
- You are not currently in prison after being convicted of a crime
- You have lived in the precinct where you vote for at least 30 days prior to the election
- You are registered to vote

The following Voter Guide policy was shared with all candidates before receiving their responses:

- The Candidate Questionnaire was sent to all candidates from all parties
- Candidates replies are printed without editing or verification
- Candidates are listed by district, but in no particular order
- Candidates who did not respond to our questionnaire by the provided deadline are listed with the notation, "No response received by deadline."

- Based on your address, you will have different different district City Council candidates to choose from
- Both the Mayoral Candidates and At-Large City Council Candidates will be on everyone's ballots

Questions Sent to All Candidates

- 1. **Qualifications:** Why do you believe you are qualified to be the next elected Mayor/City Councilor of Carmel?
- 2. **Agenda:** What are your top 3 agenda items to address in Carmel if you are elected as Mayor/City Councilor?
- 3. **School Safety:** The national rise in school shootings has parents, school districts, and law enforcement agencies looking for ways to ensure schools are safe. Do you believe school safety is an issue of concern in Carmel? If so, what would be your plan to address these concerns?
- 4. **Inclusion:** The Hamilton County Muslim community is historically an immigrant community with limited political engagement.

 Organizations like IMAN have worked hard to increase voter and political engagement within the Muslim community. How do you see your role in increasing participation from groups like the Muslim community in city government and various decision making processes?
- 5. **Economic Strategy & Retention:** Many people move to Carmel in order to raise their families with such top rated school systems and amenities. Sue Finkam Republican Mayoral Candidate

Qualifications:

School Safety:

School safety is a concern in every town and city in America.

I will ensure our public safety teams continue to collaborate with school admins and federal agencies so school facilities are enhanced and access points controlled.

I will support use of mental health counselors (funded by safety referendum)

I will make sure all public safety personnel and communications teams drill on disasters to ensure an effective response

I will ensure school resource officers and school safety specialist collaborate I will be a strong partner to school admins across the board.

It should be noted that the Carmel Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 185 and Carmel Professional Firefighters Union 4444 have endorsed me because of my commitment to and plan for public safety.

Inclusion:

My goal is to involve our international community in more roles on city boards, commissions and committees. In that manner, more people from diverse communities will better understand and contribute to our city, breaking down barriers of engagement. I hope that also leads to more people from the Muslim community and others applying to work in our city. I also want to see an international center/village in our community to celebrate and learn about our various art,s cultures, food, faiths and languages.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

We will continue to attract quality jobs if we can retain quality talent. We will retain quality talent if we continue to offer an amazing quality of place. We have done that in the past by creating a safe, clean, vibrant and diverse, welcoming community. Additionally, as your Mayor, we need to supplement that strategy with a data-driven economic development department to hunt for key businesses that complement our already high-quality industries in the city. And we need to invest in a robust relationship-based retention program to ensure our key businesses remain in Carmel as they evolve and grow.

As a part of that retention strategy, I would add a business liaison position so we can serve businesses better, and help make them more successful, so they can focus on the bottom line and their families.

Finally, we also need to ensure we have strong regional approach to economic development. We are missing opportunities by not having a strongly branded region. I look forward to being at the table and representing Carmel for these conversations. It should also be noted that OneZone Chamber, Indy Chamber, Metropolitan Board of Realtors R-PAC and the Builders Association of Greater Indianapolis PAC have all endorsed me for my economic and workforce development initiatives.



Miles Nelson Democrat Mayoral Candidate

Qualifications:

My background as an entrepreneur with decades of experience in business ownership, team development, executive leadership, and nonprofit board service will serve me well as Carmel's next Mayor. Currently, I am a Carmel City Councilor for the West District, President of AOI which is an executive search firm, former owner and managing partner of Dog Ear Publishing for 12 years, and former owner of the marketing company M. Nelson & Associates for 28 years,. I am a past board member and President of IPS Foundation, a past board member of Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation, a past board member of CASA - Marion County, a past board member of the Hispanic Business Council - Indy Chamber, and a past board member of Hooverwood Assisted Living.

My business experience and community involvement in a wide array of activities make me uniquely qualified to be Mayor of Carmel.

Agenda:

- 1. Keep Carmel moving forward so that it continues to be a welcoming, inclusive and environmentally friendly city. Forward thinking cities attract and retain talent by creating a community where everyone is made to feel included, appreciated, and invested in the city's success.
- 2. Ensure Carmel has a strong economy by employing smart fiscal management that brings in new investments from businesses and attracts a well-educated workforce to fill those new opportunities.
- 3. School Safety:

School safety should be everyone's concern - not just in Carmel, but around the state and the entire country. It's clear that our schools are under increasing pressure to go beyond simply educating our children. I have a daughter at Carmel High School so this is personal to me.

As Mayor, I will work with our first responders, the SRO's within our schools, our school administration, school board, teachers, and parents to ensure that the Carmel School District is prepared, trained, and equipped to keep our children and the teachers safe.

Inclusion:

As Mayor, I would work to increase political engagement among all groups in Carmel, including the Muslim community. Here are some specific things I would do:

- As Mayor I have the power to appoint individuals to our boards and commissions. Our Carmel Boards and commissions need to look and sound more like the city they represent.
- I will create opportunities for the Muslim community and other groups to learn about the political process and get involved. This could include holding voter education workshops or creating mentorship programs.
- We should make it easier for all people, regardless of their background, to participate in government and in the political process.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

My company is an executive search firm so I know first hand the need to retain young talent and I have the expertise required to address this issue. We need to partner with surrounding communities to create a regional economic powerhouse that competes with cities like Nashville, Charlotte, Denver and Austin that are attracting our young talent.

We need to walk the talk of young people. They want a city that is environmentally friendly. We'll be focused on environmentally friendly policies that also have a good return on investment. Young people also want a city that is welcoming so that regardless of skin color, religious beliefs, who you love, or your age, they know that Carmel is a city the wants them, welcomes them, and encourages them to be successful.

We will build on the legacy of Mayor Brainard to keep Carmel moving forward as an inclusive, environmentally friendly city because those are issues that are important to attracting and retaining ouryoung people.





Jeff Worrell Republican City Council Candidate At-Large

Qualifications:

Prior to running for City Council in 2016, I served as a Redevelopment Commissioner for 11 years. During that time I had the opportunity to learn the inner workings of Carmel city government. I used that knowledge to serve the citizens of Carmel as a City Councilor for two terms. I also ran a successful Carmel based medical equipment business creating jobs and adding to the local economy. I served as President of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce twice, served on the St. Vincent Hospital Board of Directors, Carmel Clay Parks Board, PrimeLife Enrichment Senior Center Board of Directors and multiple non-profit boards. The next Council will have 6 new members. If I am re-elected, I intend to provide institutional knowledge to my new colleagues to help them serve their constituents.

Agenda:

My primary focus will be crime prevention, education and responsible development. The four campaign issues and positions are detailed at Jeff4Carmel.com.

School Safety:

I have a strong working relationship with our local school system. As part of my effort to listen to and understand the point of view of my constituents, I am in frequent contact with our school administrators. I am confident that school safety is a top priority of our school administration and if I hear a concern, I am sure that my input will be welcome. I have encouraged and supported a strong presence of public safety officers in each of our 15 school buildings. These School Resource Officers (SRO) are employees of the Carmel Police Department and are specially trained in their only job – school safety. This exceptional commitment is the result of a school safety referendum passed in 2019 which I supported. This referendum will come before the voters for renewal again in our next term of office and I will support this referendum again.



Inclusion:

I have built a reputation as your city council member to listen carefully to your concerns and to act when it makes sense. I am also a strong supporter of a diverse and culturally rich community that is inclusive of all races and religions. Our local government has an open process for applying for positions on our boards and commissions. Our next mayor and council have responsibilities to fill these positions and I am committed to seeking input and service from all people. Anyone that expresses a willingness to serve will have my full support.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

It is important to protect and preserve our status as a top-rated community for all people to safely live, work, play, retire, and raise a family. It is healthy for our children to experience other areas of the United States, but my primary mission is to make sure they know they are encouraged to return to Carmel. Rich Taylor Republican City Council Candidate At-Large

Qualifications:

I have a deep understanding of municipal finance, municipal operations and governing. I have over 18 years of finance and banking experience. I have served as President of the Carmel Clay Board of Parks & Recreation for 6 years and as a board executive for over 13 years. I was originally appointed to the Parks Board in 2010 and served as Board Treasurer. The Monon Community Center opened in 2007 and sustained an operational loss of over \$1 million per year in 2007, 2008 and 2009. Working with the staff and my fellow board members as the Board Treasurer we implemented a fiscal plan to ensure sustainability in 2010. The Monon Community Center's revenue exceeded its expenses my first year as treasurer and has received no taxpayer subsidy for operations since my help implementing the fiscal plan. As part of the fiscal governing body for the City of Carmel, I will ensure balanced budgets and low taxes.

I have a proven record of serving the community:

- Raised over \$300,000 from the business community to fund CarmelFest from 2005 to 2010.
- One of twenty community leaders invited to serve in the inaugural Carmel Clay Schools Expedition leadership class
- Help to reestablish the Carmel Clay Public Library Foundation raising thousands of dollars for library programs.
- Served as President of the Carmel City Center Community Development Corporation which developed the Center for the Performing Arts venues.

Agenda:

School Safety:

School safety is an issue of concern. This is why I publicly supported the Carmel Clay Schools Public Safety Referendum in 2019. The referendum provided funding to staff a School Resource Officer at each Carmel Clay School. The Carmel Police Department School Resource Officer program was recently recognized with the Model Agency at the National Association of School Resource Officers conference this summer. I have been endorsed by the Carmel Fraternal Order of Police because of my ongoing support for the School Resource Officer program. I plan to ensure our SROs receive the top training and equipment to keep our schools safe. The Public Safety referendum will need to be renewed in 2027. As a City Councilor, I will support the renewal of the referendum to ensure Carmel Clay Schools has the resources to keep our children safe.

Inclusion:

Under my leadership with Carmel Clay Parks, the Parks Department specifically targets and engages minority populations in the Bear Creek master planning process. This includes members of the Al Salaam Foundation. I would like to regularly meet with various faith leaders to understand their needs, wants, and ideas. I would encourage members of these communities to be appointed and included on various boards and commissions.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

Young workers are choosing where they would like to live first and then finding a job. Carmel has created an amazing built environment with unmatched quality of life. Carmel is a community that provides the quality of life that attracts and retains top talent. We need to attract diverse employers and high paying jobs to ensure that job opportunities continue to be available for Carmel's youth. The City needs to create an economic development department with the sole focus of attracting and retaining employers of choice to our community.





Sara Draper Democrat City Council Candidate At-Large

Qualifications:

My global experience and skill set equip me to be a City Councilor. I am an Oxford University graduate, speak 5 languages and effectively communicate cross-culturally. My professional experience is in auditing and market research for global companies.

I moved to the US in 2000 but could not become a citizen and vote until 2013. This disenfranchisement has made me passionate about representation for ALL. The skills I've learned in over a decade as a Guardian ad Litem, advocating on behalf of abused and neglected children in the court system, are perfect tools for me to represent constituents with courage and conviction.

I served on the Buildings & Maintenance Committee for the Village of WestClay, making decisions on asset maintenance and replacement, similar to decisions taken by City Council. I will represent women, who are currently underrepresented, and the 13% of Carmel's residents who were foreign born. In the 2022 Midterms, 49.5% of the Carmel vote was Democrat. Those Democrats deserve to be represented on Council.

Agenda:

My top agenda items can be summarized by my campaign's core values, which are:

- People Focused Council should make decisions that positively impact the lives of ALL
 of Carmel's residents and business stakeholders, regardless of their gender, race, faith or
 socioeconomic status. Sustainability and climate change should also be at the heart of
 the decision making process.
- Fiscal Responsibility Carmel's tax revenue should be invested in a responsible manner that benefits ALL of Carmel. New spending should be scrutinized for its impact on the City's financial strength, e.g. the S&P rating, before it is approved. Waste must be minimized.
- Accessibility and Transparency A Councilor's responsibility is to be accessible to ALL of their constituents. I will be as approachable and transparent as possible. I plan to do this by holding regular public coffees and responding to emails or calls within 48 hours.

School Safety:

I believe school safety is an issue throughout the country. I am the first and only Democrat to receive the endorsement of the Carmel FOP, which shows my commitment to public safety. I have also earned the Gun Sense Distinction from Moms Demand Action, which demonstrates my belief in sensible gun laws. No other candidate on the ballot has obtained both these awards.

I believe strongly that we must prioritize addressing the epidemic of gun violence in our schools. I come from the UK where we experienced one school shooting, which resulted in the Government changing the law. There have been no further school shootings. If the political will is present, this issue can be effectively addressed.

School safety goes beyond the risk of a mass shooting. After the murder of George Floyd, we saw the establishment of Carmel Against Racial Injustice and an outpouring of testimony from black and brown children who did not feel safe at school due to racial discrimination and harassment. As a City we need to demonstrate that intolerance and hate is not welcome in Carmel by electing Councilors who will stand up against hate and set the tone for our community. Carmel should be an inclusive city where ALL are welcomed and valued and, most importantly, feel safe.

Inclusion:

I am a firm believer in the phrase 'If you can see it, you can be it.' I am an immigrant from the UK, and became a naturalized citizen 10 years ago. It is the honor of my life to be on the ballot in Carmel this year, and I am proud to be in a position to represent the 13% of Carmel who are foreign-born per the 2020 Census. My campaign has knocked on over 12,500 doors in Carmel and it's been encouraging and energizing to meet so many immigrants who are excited to see me run for office to represent them. Many have commented that it is like seeing the American Dream in action, and that it makes them feel included and valued, and gives them hope for their children.

I believe in reflective democracy - elected bodies who are reflective of the community they serve make more inclusive decisions. The more diverse we can make our elected and appointed bodies, the more informed decisions those bodies make, which is to the benefit of everyone. And the more our community sees those bodies embrace diversity, the more willing diverse populations are to become involved, so the decisions made become more and more inclusive. It's a virtuous circle which can only help better represent ALL of our community.



Economic Strategy & Retention:

Young talent seeks places with high quality of life, excellent public amenities and schools. Carmel is competing with places like Austin or Charlotte to attract corporate HQs and the young professionals these businesses need. Carmel does provide an excellent quality of life, with our Crown Jewels, our schools, parks, arts organizations and public gathering spaces. I believe housing represents a barrier to these young professionals, and is a big obstacle to economic growth in Carmel. Attainable housing, especially for young graduates, is in short supply. My daughter, a college senior, won't be able to afford to live independently in Carmel when she graduates, so this is personal to me. We need to press developers to include workforce housing in new developments and to build non-luxury options. The lack of appropriate housing for seniors who wish to downsize creates a logjam for young families who want a single family home. We need to urgently find innovative ways to provide options for seniors to remain in Carmel.

The lack of attainable housing also presents a problem in attracting workers for our service economy, especially as we have no public transportation from surrounding cities. Ideally we would have addressed the dysfunctional housing market 10-15 years ago, but I think we can find innovative solutions to our housing issues now, to ensure Carmel remains an attractive location for businesses to plant their roots, and to allow our local economy to continue to grow.





Jake Madore Democrat City Council Candidate At-Large

Qualifications:

I believe I'm the best candidate because of my day job. Since my time at the IU-McKinney school of law, I've focused on protecting taxpayers from government overreach. This is what I do professionally, and this is what I will do for the citizens of Carmel.

We need city councilors who will; question decisions made behind closed doors, use a fiscally responsible mindset to review budget items which have exploded in cost, and protect taxpayers from city overreach. I know I'm the best candidate for all of these issues, because I do this on a daily basis in the private sector, and I'm ready to use this skill set for my neighbors as well.

Agenda:

Our elected officials must listen to citizen feedback and more importantly, be brave enough to stand up for what is right. We cannot be afraid to defend our teachers and to ensure members of our community have the freedom to worship however they please in our diverse community. This will ensure we can continue to grow our great city.

School Safety:

Providing mental health services to our community members and students is an important part of keeping us all safe. But, we must vote for candidates who actually believe this. As we have seen in Fishers, if we vote for the wrong candidates they will work to take money away from much needed mental health programs.

I will vote "Yes" for CCS this fall to maintain our quality of educational experience and I will always work to ensure we are keeping our community safe by funding our local police and community mental health programs.

Inclusion:

The most basic role the City Council should commit to is to listen and respond to community feedback. Councilors must be willing to work with the community to reach decisions that benefit everyone and right now that doesn't happen often enough. I am here to listen and embrace a community driven decision making model. That is what a government for the people and by the people means.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

The City of Carmel is a unique community within Indiana. We have many different cultures, religions, and family orientations which we all should to embrace. However, hate groups want to attack these differences which only increases our brain drain problem. I believe standing up to protect these differences is how we can build an environment to attract and retain the next generation of families. Our differences make this city great, and we need to ensure all residents are free to live a life that is open and honest without fear.





Courtney Culver Democrat City Council Candidate North Central District

Qualifications:

I have the professional acumen and experience to serve Carmel on City Council, and I have lived in the district for more than 11 years. I have over two decades of experience managing global teams, massive budgets and multi-year projects. I am an empathetic and dedicated leader ready to serve my city.

Agenda:

Community safety in Carmel relies on investments in Fire and Police departments to accommodate the city's growth. Prioritizing infrastructure and financial readiness for future population expansion is crucial for resident protection.

Advocacy for All is a City Councilor's duty. I will actively engage residents and businesses, seeking their opinions and concerns.

Fiscal Responsibility & Transparency ensures responsible budgeting for economic safety and growth while promoting transparent fiscal policies.

School Safety:

Yes, I believe school safety is an issue of concern in Carmel and in every school in America. I believe it's important for our city government to maintain and foster a positive relationship with local law enforcement and its public schools, to ensure a comprehensive approach is taken to keep our schools safe.

I will advocate for funding for public safety and mental health professionals dedicated to our schools and youth. The presence of SROs in our schools is crucial and widely appreciated by all community members. It helps build trust between law enforcement and the students as well.

The city can also partner with CCS to ensure regular safety audits and assessments are performed - school safety work is never 'done' and continuous improvements should be made as our community grows and as the state gun laws in IN become more lenient. By taking a comprehensive approach to school safety and involving various stakeholders, city governments can help create a secure learning environment for students and contribute to the well-being of the community as a whole.

Inclusion:

I believe Carmel's city government should proactively engage the Muslim community and other immigrant communities to understand how it can be more inclusive of its culture in our city. I have been personally surprised that the City Council meeting Invocations that I have participated in have all been from Christian clergy people- even during Hanukkah. I value the Muslim community and the growing diversity in Carmel. I believe an advisory board or committee solely focused on welcoming the immigrant community (I believe it's close to 15% now in Carmel) would help ensure we are fostering a welcoming city for all.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

I believe strongly that economic strategies in the following areas will attract and retain young, educated and enthusiastic youth in Carmel:

Foster a thriving job market by attracting companies and industries that are attractive to young professionals, such as tech startups, creative industries, and green technology. Address the affordability of housing in Carmel, as high housing costs can be a significant barrier. Carmel can encourage the development and protection of affordable housing options through partnerships with developers, revising any ordinances blocking affordable renovations of existing homes, and zoning reform in the city.

Establish partnerships between local corporations businesses and educational institutions to create internship and job opportunities for students.

Continue the city's focus on a vibrant cultural and art scene with theaters, galleries, music venues.

Continue to design streets and neighborhoods with walkable streets, bike lanes, and easy access to our parks and community areas like Midtown.

Foster a diverse and inclusive community that welcomes people from various backgrounds and cultures. Celebrate diversity through events, festivals, and community initiatives. Implement and prioritize sustainability and environmental initiatives, such as renewable energy programs and green infrastructure, to appeal to environmentally conscious young professionals.





Adam Aasen Republican City Council Candidate Southeast District

Qualifications:

I've served on the city council for the past three years and during that time I voted to bring a grocery store to a part of town that desperately needed it, voted to fund needed road improvements to keep residents' safe, and authored an ordinance to crack down on animal abuse. I currently serve on the Carmel Plan Commission as well, helping maintain the look and feel of our city. I'm a past HOA board member and I've served on boards for Carmel Rotary, the Carmel Education Foundation and Janus Developmental Services. I was named Volunteer of the Year by OneZone in 2019.

Agenda:

- 1. Crime Prevention -- Carmel consistently ranks as one of the safest cities in the state, but I want to keep it that way by ensuring we offer good pay and benefits to police officers. That way we can always attract the best for our staffing needs.
- 2. Fiscal Responsibility -- We must prioritize funding "needs" over "wants" and make smart investments.
- 3. Protecting Neighborhoods -- Carmel is a special place, and we must protect the character and charm of our city and its neighborhoods by preventing overdevelopment.

School Safety:

I supported our school safety referendum which put School Resource Officers in every school. I would also partner with our police department to ensure we have safe schools. I have been endorsed by Carmel police for my ability to work with our police on solutions.

Inclusion:

I hold regular town halls and put out a monthly newsletter to engage with my constituents. It also helps to reach out to all people.

Economic Strategy & Retention:

As we continue to build our downtown, we need to plan for engaging public spaces and retail/restaurants that create a place where we all - regardless of our backgrounds - can safely gather and have fun.



Jeremy Eltz Democrat City Council Candidate Southeast District

Qualifications:

We live in a representative democracy, so in my opinion every citizen is qualified to run for office and should! For us to have a healthy and vibrant democracy, the people need to feel represented by the leaders in office. If we just keep having the same people run for office, apathy and division occur (sound familiar). I encourage anyone reading this to consider running for something and I would be happy to help you. On top of that belief, I feel I am fully qualified both professionally and educationally.

I currently serve as the Director of Rural Education at the Center of Excellence in Leadership of Learning at the University of Indianapolis. I am fortunate to travel the state, visiting all sorts of communities, to support their school districts. I was a middle school school science teacher in Pike Township in Indianapolis before I joined the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE). At the IDOE, I created the state's first STEM plan, the STEM School Certification, adopted new science standards, added computer science standards for grades K-8, and adopted the Green Ribbon Schools Award for Indiana to support green/sustainable practices in schools. I received my PhD in educational leadership and currently hold a school superintendent license. My background leads me to make decisions based in research, evidence, and fact; which are desperately needed on the city council. I will always seek expertise to make informed decisions that represent the best interests of my district!

Agenda:

1) Give the council back to the citizens of Carmel. I'm the only candidate that can say my vote and campaign is not influenced by special interests and big money donors. This is a major problem in politics and it is about time we start holding candidates to higher expectations. I have committed to limiting campaign contributions to under \$100. We need political leaders willing to buck the current system and lead with integrity. I would like to pursue efforts to increase direct democracy. The decisions made by the city council impact quality of life, property values, and the long-term viability of the city. It makes sense to me that the people should have more say than every 4 years. 2) Safe, secure, and supportive Carmel community. This includes making roads, roundabouts, and trails safe for ALL users. Police, Fire, EMS all have the resources they need to perform their jobs at a high level.

We can continue growing green space to reduce city heat, pollution, and noise. 3.5) Support our schools! Quality schools are needed for continued growth, innovation, and talent attraction in Carmel. School Safety:

I am the only educator running for office and I am running in part because of this issue. I am also a Mom's Demand Action Gun Sense Candidate. Current leaders don't seem to want to address the root causes of safety issues in schools (or society as a whole) because that would require a ton of work, money, and painful introspection. School safety is an area where the city and the school should be partnering. It shouldn't just fall to the school to fix:

- 1. Promote and provide easy access to mental health services within schools and communities.
- 2. Enhance physical security measures, such as installing security cameras, controlled access points, and panic buttons, one-way glass film applications, etc. Conduct regular safety drills and train school staff, students, and parents.
- 3. Implement anti-bullying and anti-harassment programs to create a positive school culture where students feel safe and supported.
- 4. Foster a positive and inclusive school environment where students feel connected to their peers and trusted adults.
- 5. Encourage parents and community to participate in school safety committees.
- 6. Early Warning Systems that track students' attendance, behavior, and academic performance to identify those who may be struggling and in need of support.
- 7. Incorporate social emotional learning programs into the curriculum to help students develop emotional intelligence, empathy, and conflict resolution skills.

Inclusion:

City leaders should view their role as a facilitator of community engagement and participation, working alongside the Muslim community and other marginalized groups to create a city where everyone's voice is heard, and decisions are made with the input of all residents. City leaders can foster a more inclusive, equitable, and cohesive city for everyone. We need leaders that will actively engage with the Muslim community to build trust and establish meaningful relationships, attend community events, meetings, and cultural celebrations. We can create opportunities for open dialogue and actively listen to the concerns, needs, and aspirations while establishing clear and accessible channels of communication such as community forums, town halls, and digital platforms. We can ensure that city information and resources are available in multiple languages to accommodate diverse linguistic needs and provide cultural competency education for city employees and officials to enhance their understanding of the Muslim community's culture, values, and traditions. I will also encourage members of the Muslim community to participate in city government by running for office, serving on advisory boards, or applying for city positions. We can't just passively expect participation from the Muslim community, we have to proactively reach out and invite them in!

Anita Joshi Democrat City Council Candidate West District

School Safety:

We need to address the environment in the schools and the community at large. We need to be able to address the bullying and mental illness issues that often drive youth to commit violence. Creating a school community that is welcoming of differences and will allow children to be true to themselves and that is an important part of the solution.

Inclusion:

If I am elected I will be the first minority woman ever elected to Carmel City Council. I have always been involved in advocating for marginalized and minority communities. My work with Women's Fund as their Grants Committee Chair allowed me to learn about the challenges that many women in all communities face in establishing themselves financially. I have been the chair of the diversity committee on the board of the Orchard School and was recognized by Butler University as a leader in faith and vocation. I have been a leader on the executive committee at the Center for Interfaith Cooperation and have visited Universities, Synagogues, Mosques, Temples and Churches and have been asked to speak at many throughout Indiana. I have been the Vice Chair at Brebeuf Jesuit and led the Medical Task Force's Covid response for them. It should be apparent that I am comfortable working with all people in all settings because I truly see all of us as members of the same human family. Diversity is not something I need to plan to work on, it is a part of my DNA and all will be welcome to discuss issues and concerns with me always. As a physician I am used to being on call and available to my patients. We need to understand the infrastructure and maintenance costs and a clear understanding of the projected revenues and the risks that would impact those revenues negatively. We need to ensure that we have the funds to maintain the development that has already occurred and plan for sustainable and innovative solutions to future development. Several years ago, Carmel citizens voted to pay additional taxes to increase school safety by funding School Resource Officers (SRO) (currently 21 police officers are assigned to our schools) and additional fortification and safety measures in our schools.

However, the root of the problem also needs to be addressed through increasing mental health services as well as teaching people about diversity and appreciation of different cultures, beliefs and ethnicities. Schools provide a great way for children of different cultures to grow together as they attend classes and study, and participate together in extracurricular team activities. There should be opportunities to learn about American customs and history as well as to share their own family and ethnic customs. This helps students to learn and appreciate the diversity of classmates from different cultures and ethnicities as well as different family values. Our local festivals and community events help bring people of all ages together to share diverse cultures, arts, music and food. Education and direct involvement is the key to ensuring that people have the resources and opportunities to build relationships and learn from others. We want our children to be free to go to school without fear, and our citizens to be free to worship without fear, and free to share our beliefs and values in a city where all feel welcome.

Inclusion:

My grandparents were Italian immigrants, and I grew up with a mix of American and Italian food and culture. I've had opportunities to travel and I love getting to know people from different cultures and ethnicities, learning new languages, understanding different belief systems and religions, and experiencing different art, music, and food. Now, we can find these experiences right here in our own community as we meet our diverse neighbors and attend community events and festivals.

As a City Councilor, I will be a voice to help represent our diverse voices in Carmel. I have already, and will continue to get folks of different backgrounds involved in city planning and appointed to advisory committees and commissions. One of my top priorities, as a City Councilor will be to engage and survey every Carmel resident; we need to involve a more diverse group of Carmel citizens and stakeholders in our planning processes. I would use a variety of communication methods to engage diverse populations. We must continue our investment in our world class amenities, increase our green initiatives, and also add more co-working facilities for remote workers and entrepreneurs.

College grads often want to explore living and working in different cities, but many young adults return to Carmel to settle down after they tire of big city crime, traffic, high cost of living and other problems.

With my background in economic development, I will help Carmel to establish a more robust Department of Economic Development, which will work closely with One Zone and the Indiana Economic Development Corporation on global business attraction, business retention and assistance, job training and recruitment. We must work together with nearby cities and counties to form a coordinated regional economic development strategy. We can also take greater advantage of our existing businesses and residents who now live in Carmel but still have ties to people and businesses in other countries.
